Related: With its snug roof, shingles and symmetrical front and back panels, this doghouse mimics a classic colonial-style home. Most home improvement centres sell plywood in practical sizes of 150cm, which is perfect even for the biggest doghouse you might want to build. You will start by marking and cutting the front and back panels as they will define the overall size and shape of the dog house. Two side panels, a floorboard and a roof will match the sizes of the front and back panels you first establish. Dogs come in all sizes, and so should their houses. First, get a rough feeling of the height and length of your dog. The height is measured from the floor to the top of the head, while the dog stands. The length is measured from the tips of your dog's front paws to your back, including the tail when the dog lies prone and flat rather than curled up or on its side. Medium-sized dogs like boxers and collies tend to measure 20 inches to 30 inches tall and 25 inches to 35 inches long. Extra-large dogs such as the Great Tributes, Saint Bernards and Newfoundland usually measure a height of 38 inches and 40 inches long. For a rectangular shape, where the doghouse is taller than it is wide, it cuts off a 1-foot strip with two plates so that part of the 3 feet and 4 feet remains of each. Now, place one of the plates so that the short side faces you. To measure height, most dogs will learn to bend their heads to get through the door. If you make the door too low, the dog may be reluctant to enter. Still, if you make the door too high, you risk running out of board space to reduce the top. A height of 24 inches is the average height for the door, but adjust that as needed. Then pull two parallel vertical lines that define the width of the door. 20 inches is the average width of the neck, but again, adjust for your dog. Cut the door with a jigsaw puzzle. On the front panel, mark the triangular tip that will form the roof. Start by making a marker mid-point (18 inches) at the top of the board, is the top of the peak. Rest a flat edge on the board, with one end on that middle tag and the other at the end of 20 inches down the side of the board. If desired, you can move that second measurement higher, as far as another 8 inches are concerned, for a flatter roof. But don't move it down at all, because you'll run into the door opening. Repeat the label on the other side to format the reverse V-shape. Cut with a circular saw. Use a different sheet of plywood to create a back plate. Place the front panel on top as a template and draw all shapes except the door. Remove the template and cut the back panel with a circular saw. Take two more new plywood plates to create two side panels. Cut each of them into 20 inches to produce leaves that are 20 inches by 48 inches. The 48-inch side represents the length of the dog house. Based on your dog, cut the length where you want. However, the standard length that works for most dogs is 40 inches. Since you can not dunk or screw to the side of the plywood, you need to create surfaces for nails that follow the perimeter of the front and back panels. Cut four two by four to 20 inches long each. Place these flats on the sides of the panel and dunk in place on the other side. Roof tops also need surfaces for nails. For this, cut four boards to 15 inches each, then dunk them along the roof line on the same side as other nail surfaces. Finally, the floor plan will need nail surfaces. Cut two two by four to 29 inches each, then dunk them along the bottom of the front and back panels. Two side panels need surfaces for nails on the tips and bottom. For a doghouse that is 40 inches long, cut four two by four by 36 to 36 inches long. Nail two along the side panel, each working horizontally along the upper edges and lower edges. Be careful to center each panel, as it will work in combination with the nail surfaces that you previously created on the front and back panel. Place the front and back panels together with the two side panels to form a rectangle. Keep your guests that there's still no roof at this point. Nails all together with 1 1/2-inch nails. Place the doghouse on top of another plywood bed. Make sure the doghouse is squared. Mark the footprint of the dog house on the sheet, then cut with a circular saw. Nail the product to the bottom of the dog house to form a floor. Lay one of the plywood boards on top of the dog house, along one side of the roof line. Try different configurations to find an overha that seems appropriate, then mark the board to that size and cut with a circular saw. Duplicate measurements on the second plywood board. Nail the boards to the top of the doghouse. Although it is reasonably effective in protecting your dog from the elements, the dog house will have some narrow gaps. Fill those gaps with caulk. Be especially careful to take the caulk roof ridge. For homemade and classic look, nail three cards composite shingles on top of the house for dogs. To save on use a valid roofing instead of composite shingles. Paint the doghouse any color you want. Since plywood of external quality is especially porous, it is necessary to be prime before painting. Since the area is small enough, you just need to use brushes. There is no need to use a roller or paint sprayer, although you can if you wish. Desire.
